BLAP Community Plan for 2011-2014

The Bridport Local Area Partnership

The Bridport Local Area Partnership (BLAP) was set up in 2004 to give local communities more say about what happens in the town and neighbouring parishes. With a membership of nearly one hundred local community-based organisations, the Partnership provides a stronger voice to help local people to influence decisions made by the service providers, local authorities and other bodies which affect services and development in the area. It also helps communities to take action on local issues themselves, through community projects and other activities, and supports community groups.

Bridport Local Area Partnership covers an area which includes Bridport and West Bay and surrounding parishes, as far as Charmouth in the west and Puncknowle in the east. Its members are a wide range of community-based organisations from across the area, including the town and parish councils, voluntary agencies, residents' associations, business organisations and a variety of community groups with interests in sport, the arts, history, leisure and social activities; addressing concerns about the environment, health, transport, access etc; and dealing with issues affecting all sectors of the community, including the elderly, the young, the less able, carers, etc.

Bridport Local Area Partnership has no money of its own and no executive powers. It has one officer post funded jointly by West Dorset District Council and Bridport Town Council, which also provides office space and administrative support.

The BLAP Community Plan 2011-2014

The first BLAP Plan was published in 2006, and was the outcome of a major mapping exercise of all the local community consultations carried out in previous years, including those carried out under the Market and Coastal Towns Initiative, as well as consultations for the regeneration of West Bay and Bridport's South West Quadrant and for parish plans in the Bridport area.

The Plan formed the basis of Annual Action Plans for each of the years 2007 to 2010. These Annual Plans focused on Key Actions which were seen as achievable in the short term and where it was felt BLAP could make a difference.

In 2009 it was decided to update the original 2006 Plan and to carry out a major review of activities, plans and priorities for the Bridport area. During 2010 further consultation took place, through questionnaires circulated to local groups and organisations, at the Melplash Agricultural Show in August 2010, and by direct contact with groups and organisations, to update information on their current activities, plans and objectives.

The BLAP Community Plan for 2011-2014 is the outcome of this review and accompanying consultations, and it is intended will form the basis for Annual Action Plans for the each of the years 2011 to 2014.

Activities and Actions

The BLAP Plan 2011-2014 recognises BLAP's non-executive status and limited resources, and focuses on activities and actions through which it can support, strengthen and in some cases co-ordinate the work of local groups, organisations and councils working for the wellbeing of the Bridport area community.
